Proposition BB (STATUTORY)-STATE OF COLORADO

MAY THE STATE RETAIN AND SPEND STATE REVENUES THAT OTHERWISE WOULD BE REFUNDED FOR EXCEEDING AN ESTIMATE INCLUDED IN THE BALLOT INFORMATION BOOKLET FOR PROPOSITION AA AND USE THESE REVENUES TO PROVIDE FORTY MILLION DOLLARS FOR PUBLIC SCHOOL BUILDING CONSTRUCTION AND FOR OTHER NEEDS, SUCH AS LAW ENFORCEMENT, YOUTH PROGRAMS, AND MARIJUANA EDUCATION AND PREVENTION PROGRAMS, INSTEAD OF REFUNDING THESE REVENUES TO RETAIL MARIJUANA CULTIVATION FACILITIES, RETAIL MARIJUANA PURCHASERS, AND OTHER TAXPAYERS?

1A-ADAMS COUNTY

WITHOUT IMPOSING ANY NEW TAX OR INCREASING ANY TAX RATE, SHALL ADAMS COUNTY RECEIVE \$10 MILLION FROM THE CITY AND COUNTY OF DENVER (DENVER) AND RECEIVE AN EQUAL AND PERPETUAL SHARE OF ALL AVAILABLE TAX REVENUES COLLECTED BY DENVER FROM ADDITIONAL COMMERCIAL DEVELOPMENT AT DENVER INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT (DIA) IN EXCHANGE FOR AMENDING THE INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENTS ENTERED INTO BY DENVER AND ADAMS COUNTY THAT ALLOWED FOR THE CREATION OF DIA; AND WITH ADAMS COUNTY TO BE AUTHORIZED TO ENTER INTO AN AMENDATORY INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT, WITH THE PURPOSE OF THE AMENDMENTS BEING TO ALLOW ADDITIONAL COMMERCIAL DEVELOPMENT AND PROMOTE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AND JOB CREATION IN AND AROUND DIA IN BOTH DENVER AND ADAMS COUNTY AND THE MUNICIPALITIES IN ADAMS COUNTY; AND WITH ADAMS COUNTY TO BE AUTHORIZED TO SHARE A PORTION OF THE TAX REVENUES RECEIVED FROM DENVER WITH MUNICIPALITIES IN

ADAMS COUNTY BY CREATING MULTIPLE-FISCAL YEAR FINANCIAL OBLIGATIONS WITHIN THE MEANING OF, AND TO RECEIVE, SPEND AND SHARE SUCH TAX REVENUES WITHOUT REGARD TO ANY SPENDING, REVENUE-RAISING OR OTHER LIMITATIONS CONTAINED IN, ARTICLE X, SECTION 20 OF THE COLORADO CONSTITUTION OR OTHER LAW?

2H-BENNETT

SHALL TOWN OF BENNETT TAXES BE INCREASED \$600,000 IN 2016 (FIRST FULL FISCAL YEAR DOLLAR INCREASE) AND THEN ANNUALLY BY WHATEVER ADDITIONAL AMOUNTS ARE RAISED THEREAFTER BY THE IMPOSITION OF A SALES TAX AT THE RATE OF 1.00 % AND SHALL TOWN OF BENNETT DEBT BE INCREASED \$5.7 MILLION, WITH A MAXIMUM REPAYMENT COST OF \$9.85 MILLION; SUBJECT TO THE FOLLOWING: ALL OR ANY PORTION OF THE NET PROCEEDS OF THE TOWN SALES TAX, AS DETERMINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES, MAY BE DEPOSITED TO THE TOWN'S SALES TAX CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT FUND, WHICH IS HEREBY AUTHORIZED TO BE CREATED, TO BE COLLECTED, RETAINED AND SPENT TO FINANCE THE CONSTRUCTION, MAINTENANCE, REPAIR, REPLACEMENT, EXPANSION, ACQUISITION, REHABILITATION AND RENOVATION OF EXISTING AND PLANNED STREETS AND OTHER STREET RELATED CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS WITHIN THE TOWN AS DETERMINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES, OR TO PAY DEBT SERVICE ON DEBT ISSUED FOR SUCH PURPOSES OR TO PAY THE COSTS OF OPERATING OR MAINTAINING IMPROVEMENTS FINANCED FROM THE CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT FUND; ANY PORTION OF THE NET PROCEEDS OF SUCH ADDITIONAL SALES TAX WHICH ARE NOT DEPOSITED TO THE CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT FUND SHALL BE COLLECTED, RETAINED AND SPENT FOR OPERATING OR MAINTAINING ANY EXISTING OR PLANNED STREETS; THE SALES TAX INCREASE SHALL COMMENCE JANUARY 1, 2016 AND BE COLLECTED IN ADDITION TO THE TOWN'S SALES TAX OF 3.0 % UPON THE TOWN'S EXISTING SALES TAX BASE; ANY SUCH DEBT SHALL BE PAYABLE FROM THAT PORTION OF THE TOWN SALES TAXES DEPOSITED TO THE TOWN'S SALES TAX CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT FUND; ANY SUCH DEBT MAY BE SOLD IN ONE SERIES OR MORE, ON TERMS AND CONDITIONS AS THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES MAY DETERMINE, INCLUDING PROVISIONS FOR THE REDEMPTION OF THE BONDS PRIOR TO MATURITY WITH OR WITHOUT PREMIUM, ANY SUCH DEBT MAY BE REFUNDED BY THE TOWN, PROVIDED THAT AFTER THE ISSUANCE OF SUCH REFUNDING DEBT THE TOTAL OUTSTANDING PRINCIPAL AMOUNT OF ALL DEBT ISSUED PURSUANT TO THIS QUESTION DOES NOT EXCEED THE MAXIMUM PRINCIPAL AMOUNT SET FORTH ABOVE, AND PROVIDED FURTHER THAT ALL DEBT ISSUED BY THE TOWN PURSUANT TO THIS QUESTION IS ISSUED ON TERMS THAT DO NOT EXCEED THE REPAYMENT COSTS AUTHORIZED IN THIS QUESTION; AND SHALL SUCH TAX REVENUES AND THE EARNINGS THEREON OR ON THE INVESTMENT OF SUCH DEBT PROCEEDS (REGARDLESS OF AMOUNT) CONSTITUTE A VOTER-APPROVED REVENUE CHANGE AND AN EXCEPTION TO THE REVENUE AND SPENDING LIMITS OF ARTICLE X, SECTION 20 OF THE COLORADO CONSTITUTION ?

2J-AURORA

Shall Section 11-18.5 of the Aurora City Charter be repealed and the authority of the Aurora City Council with respect to providing appropriate and reasonable economic incentives for motor sports facilities be restored?

2K-BRIGHTON

WITHOUT INCREASING ANY TAX RATE OR IMPOSING ANY NEW TAX AND IN ORDER FOR THE CITY TO CONTINUE TO PROVIDE SERVICES AND PUBLIC FACILITIES AND AMENITIES TO ITS CITIZENS, INCLUDING WITHOUT LIMITATION, PUBLIC SAFETY, SUPPORT SERVICES, STREETS, AND PARK AND RECREATION, SHALL THE CITY OF BRIGHTON, COLORADO, BE AUTHORIZED TO COLLECT, RETAIN AND SPEND ALL REVENUES IT RECEIVES FROM ALL SOURCES, BEGINNING IN 2015 AND THEREAFTER, AND FOR THE FOUR

2L-BRIGHTON

WITHOUT INCREASING TAXES, SHALL THE CITY OF BRIGHTON BE AUTHORIZED TO PROVIDE HIGH-SPEED INTERNET SERVICES (ADVANCED SERVICES) AND/OR TELECOMMUNICATIONS SERVICES, AND/OR CABLE TELEVISION SERVICES TO RESIDENTS, BUSINESSES, SCHOOLS, NONPROFIT ENTITIES AND OTHER USERS OF SUCH SERVICES, INCLUDING ANY NEW AND IMPROVED HIGH BANDWIDTH SERVICES BASED ON FUTURE TECHNOLOGIES, EITHER DIRECTLY, AND/OR INDIRECTLY WITH PUBLIC AND/OR PRIVATE SECTOR PARTNERS, AS EXPRESSLY PERMITTED BY §§ 29-27-101 TO 304, "COMPETITION IN UTILITY AND ENTERTAINMENT SERVICES," OF THE COLORADO REVISED STATUTES, WITHOUT LIMITING ITS HOME RULE AUTHORITY?

2M-NORTHGLENN

WITHOUT RAISING ADDITIONAL TAXES, SHALL THE EXISTING ONE HALF PERCENT (1/2%) SALES AND USE TAX ON NON-FOOD ITEMS ORIGINALLY ADOPTED BY NORTHGLENN'S ELECTORS AT THE SPECIAL ELECTION OF MAY 9, 1989, AND EXTENDED AT THE MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS OF NOVEMBER 8, 1994, NOVEMBER 2, 1999, NOVEMBER 2, 2004, AND NOVEMBER 2, 2010, BE EXTENDED AS A VOTER APPROVED REVENUE CHANGE WITHOUT A SUNSET CLAUSE, THE PROCEEDS OF SUCH SALES AND USE TAX EXTENSION TO BE USED EXCLUSIVELY FOR THE CONSTRUCTION AND REHABILITATION OF CITY OF NORTHGLENN CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS AND THE ACQUISITION OF WATER?

2N-THORNTON

Shall the City Clerk be directed to provide sample forms and provide information on procedures for petitions; and allow initiative or referendum petitions to be withdrawn prior to 30 days before the election if the majority of signers who are designated as representatives so request; and allow the general or regular election to be a recall election if it is within 90 days of submission of the recall petition amending sections 3.4, Recall from Office, 5.7 Clerk, and 8.16, Miscellaneous Provisions on Initiative and Referendum of the Thornton City Charter?"

2P-THORNTON

Shall Section 4.5, Vacancy, of the Thornton City Charter, be amended to remove the written ballot provision and permit voting to be done openly by City Council when City Council is filling a vacant council seat?

2Q-THORNTON

Shall the Charter be updated by deleting references to positions that no longer exist, such as Utilities Director, Utilities Attorney, Utilities Department, and Career Service Board, and by utilizing updated terminology regarding qualified voter, surety bonds, and anti-discrimination language in the following sections of the Thornton City Charter: 4.17, Power to Make Contracts; 5.1, Departments Created; 5.4, City Manager – Functions and Duties; 5.6, Relationship of Council to Administrative Service; 6.2, Presiding Officer – Qualifications and Compensation; 7.2, Surety bonds; 7.4, Pecuniary Interest Prohibited; 7.6, Anti-Nepotism; 18.3, Right to Organize and Bargain Collectively; 18.17, Prohibitions; and 18.19, Impact Upon Career Service Board?

2R-THORNTON

Shall Sections 7.1, Career Service System; 8.6, Posting and Publication; and 16.4, Publications, of the Thornton City Charter be amended to delete the reference to newspapers and require City Council to establish by ordinance the publication requirements for the City?

2S-THORNTON

Shall a new Section 8.17, Single Subject Requirement – Initiated and Referred Measures, be added to the Thornton City Charter that requires any initiative or referendum on a municipal ballot to contain only one subject similar to the requirement in the State constitution for state ballot issues?

2T-THORNTON

Shall the City of Thornton, without increasing taxes, re-establish its authority to provide high-speed Internet services (advanced services), telecommunications services, cable television services, including any new and improved high bandwidth services based on future technologies, utilizing community owned infrastructure including, but not limited to the city's existing fiber optic network, to residents, businesses, schools, libraries, nonprofit entities and other users of such services, either directly or indirectly with public or private sector partners, as expressly permitted by §§ 29-27-101 to 304, "Competition in Utility and Entertainment Services," of the Colorado Revised Statutes, without limiting its home rule authority?

2U-COMMERCE CITY

SHALL THE CITY OF COMMERCE CITY TAXES BE INCREASED BY ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS IN THE FISCAL YEAR COMMENCING JANUARY 1, 2016, AND ENDING DECEMBER 31, 2016, AND BY WHATEVER ADDITIONAL AMOUNTS ARE RAISED ANNUALLY THEREAFTER BY THE IMPOSITION OF AN EXCISE TAX ON THE SALE OF MARIJUANA AND MARIJUANA PRODUCTS AS SUCH ARE AUTHORIZED BY STATE LAW COMMENCING JANUARY 1, 2016 AT THE RATE OF FIVE PERCENT OF THE PRICE PAID BY THE PURCHASER, IN ACCORDANCE WITH CITY ORDINANCE 2050; AND SHALL THE CITY BE AUTHORIZED TO COLLECT AND SPEND SUCH REVENUE AS A VOTER APPROVED REVENUE CHANGE UNDER ARTICLE X, SECTION 20 OF THE COLORADO CONSTITUTION?

2V-COMMERCE CITY

Shall Section 5.6. of the City Charter of the City of Commerce City be changed to provide two posting locations for the purpose of informing the public of the full text of ordinances in places designated by city council?

3A-STRASBURG 31J SCHOOL DISTRICT

SHALL STRASBURG SCHOOL DISTRICT 31J TAXES BE INCREASED BY \$130,000 DOLLARS IN 2015 FOR COLLECTION IN THE 2016 CALENDAR YEAR, AND BY SUCH AMOUNTS AS MAY BE COLLECTED ANNUALLY THEREAFTER THROUGH DECEMBER 31, 2030, UNLESS THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF THE DISTRICT SHALL SUBSEQUENTLY AUTHORIZE AN EXTENSION, BY THE IMPOSITION OF A MILL LEVY OF UP TO 1.383 MILLS WHICH GENERATES REVENUE, WHICH TOGETHER WITH THE REVENUES PRODUCED BY PREVIOUS VOTER AUTHORIZED TAX INCREASES OF THE DISTRICT UNDER 22-54-108, C.R.S., AS AMENDED, IS NOT GREATER THAN THIRTY PERCENT OF THE DISTRICT'S TOTAL PROGRAM FUNDING, TO BE USED FOR GENERAL FUND PURPOSES, WHICH MAY INCLUDE BUT ARE NOT LIMITED TO

- REPLACING OR ACQUIRING SCHOOL BUSES THROUGH PURCHASE OR LEASE AND PAYING

OPERATING COSTS;

AND SHALL SUCH INCREASE BE AN ADDITIONAL PROPERTY TAX MILL LEVY IN EXCESS OF THE LEVIES THE DISTRICT IS OTHERWISE AUTHORIZED BY LAW TO IMPOSE; AND SHALL THE DISTRICT BE AUTHORIZED TO COLLECT, RETAIN AND SPEND ALL REVENUES FROM SUCH TAXES AND THE EARNINGS FROM THE INVESTMENT OF SUCH REVENUES AS A VOTER APPROVED REVENUE CHANGE AND AN EXCEPTION TO THE LIMITS WHICH WOULD OTHERWISE APPLY UNDER ARTICLE X, SECTION 20 OF THE COLORADO CONSTITUTION?

3B-BYERS 32J SCHOOL DISTRICT

SHALL BYERS SCHOOL DISTRICT 32J TAXES BE INCREASED BY \$150,000 DOLLARS IN 2015 FOR COLLECTION IN 2016, AND ANNUALLY THEREAFTER FOR FIVE (5) YEARS, THROUGH AND INCLUDING THE 2020 TAX COLLECTION YEAR, SUCH TAXES TO BE DEPOSITED IN THE GENERAL FUND OF THE DISTRICT AND USED FOR EDUCATIONAL PURPOSES AS APPROVED BY THE BOARD OF EDUCATION, WHICH MAY INCLUDE BUT ARE NOT LIMITED TO:

- PURCHASING OR LEASING SCHOOL BUSES AND VEHICLES, AND PAYING OPERATING COSTS;

3C-BRIGHTON 27J SCHOOL DISTRICT

SHALL SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 27J DEBT BE INCREASED BY \$248 MILLION, WITH A REPAYMENT COST OF \$494 MILLION, AND SHALL DISTRICT TAXES BE INCREASED \$26.3 MILLION ANNUALLY, FOR ENLARGING, IMPROVING, REPAIRING OR MAKING ADDITIONS TO SCHOOL BUILDINGS, FOR EQUIPPING OR FURNISHING SCHOOL BUILDINGS, FOR IMPROVING SCHOOL GROUNDS, OR ACQUIRING, CONSTRUCTING OR IMPROVING ANY CAPITAL ASSET THAT THE DISTRICT IS AUTHORIZED BY LAW TO OWN, WHICH IMPROVEMENTS MAY INCLUDE BUT ARE NOT LIMITED TO THE FOLLOWING:

REDUCING SCHOOL OVERCROWDING AND CLASS SIZES BY ENLARGING EXISTING SCHOOL FACILITIES;

ACCOMMODATING FUTURE STUDENT GROWTH BY BUILDING A NEW HIGH SCHOOL, A NEW MIDDLE SCHOOL AND TWO NEW ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS;

LENGTHENING THE LIFE OF EXISTING EDUCATIONAL FACILITIES THROUGH REPAIRS, MAINTENANCE AND RENOVATIONS; AND

IMPROVING SECURITY ON SCHOOL CAMPUSES;

AND SHALL THE MILL LEVY BE INCREASED IN ANY YEAR WITHOUT LIMITATION AS TO RATE BUT IN NO EVENT MORE THAN \$26.3 MILLION ANNUALLY, WHICH AMOUNT SHALL BE SUFFICIENT TO PAY THE PRINCIPAL OF AND PREMIUM, IF ANY, AND INTEREST ON SUCH DEBT OR ANY REFUNDING DEBT WHEN DUE; THE AUTHORITY FOR SUCH TAX AND MILL LEVY INCREASE TO TERMINATE WHEN THE DEBT OR REFUNDING DEBT IS PAID; SUCH DEBT TO BE EVIDENCED BY THE ISSUANCE OF GENERAL OBLIGATION

BONDS OR OTHER MULTIPLE FISCAL YEAR FINANCIAL OBLIGATION; SUCH BONDS TO BE SOLD IN ONE SERIES OR MORE IN AN AGGREGATE AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED THE MAXIMUM AUTHORIZED PRINCIPAL AMOUNT AND REPAYMENT COST, ON TERMS AND CONDITIONS AS THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE DISTRICT MAY DETERMINE, INCLUDING PROVISIONS FOR REDEMPTION OF THE BONDS PRIOR TO MATURITY WITH OR WITHOUT PAYMENT OF THE PREMIUM; AND SHALL THE DISTRICT'S DEBT LIMIT BE INCREASED FROM AN AMOUNT EQUAL TO 20% OF THE DISTRICT'S ASSESSED VALUE TO AN AMOUNT EQUAL TO 6% OF THE DISTRICT'S ACTUAL VALUE, EACH AS CERTIFIED BY THE COUNTY ASSESSORS OF ADAMS AND WELD COUNTIES AND THE CITY AND COUNTY OF BROOMFIELD; AND SHALL THE PROCEEDS OF SUCH BONDS AND THE REVENUES FROM SUCH TAXES AND ANY EARNINGS FROM THE INVESTMENT OF SUCH PROCEEDS AND REVENUES BE COLLECTED AND SPENT WITHOUT LIMITATION OR CONDITION, AND WITHOUT LIMITING THE COLLECTION OR SPENDING OF OTHER REVENUES OR FUNDS BY THE DISTRICT UNDER ARTICLE X, SECTION 20 OF THE COLORADO CONSTITUTION OR ANY OTHER LAW?

4A-ARAPAHOE LIBRARY DISTRICT

SHALL ARAPAHOE LIBRARY DISTRICT TAXES BE INCREASED \$ 5,997,279.00 ANNUALLY (ESTIMATED REVENUES IN THE YEAR 2016) AND BY WHATEVER ADDITIONAL AMOUNTS ARE RECEIVED THEREAFTER BY INCREASING THE MILL LEVY FROM 4.2 TO 5.4 MILLS FOR THE PURPOSE OF REPLENISHING RESERVES EXPENDED IN RECENT YEARS AND MAINTAINING LIBRARY SERVICES INCLUDING BUT NOT LIMITED TO:
UPDATING BOOKS, TECHNOLOGY AND RESEARCH MATERIALS;

WORKING WITH PARENTS AND CAREGIVERS TO ENSURE EACH CHILD HAS A STRONG START AND IS KINDERGARTEN READY;

PROVIDING LITERACY BASED PROGRAMMING;

PROVIDING A LINK TO THE OUTSIDE WORLD FOR THE HOME BOUND WHILE BUILDING COMMUNITY CONNECTIONS;

INCREASING SERVICES TO THE AGING POPULATION;

ENSURING ADEQUATE STAFF TO ADDRESS PATRON NEEDS AND REQUESTS;

PROVIDING LIFELONG EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES FOR STUDENTS AND ADULTS;

AND SHALL THE PROCEEDS OF SUCH TAX LEVY IN 2016 AND THEREAFTER BE COLLECTED AND SPENT REGARDLESS OF THE LIMITATIONS OF SECTION 29-1-301, C.R.S.; AND SHALL ALL REVENUES RECEIVED BY THE DISTRICT FROM SUCH INCREASE BE COLLECTED AND SPENT WITHOUT LIMITATION OR CONDITION, AND WITHOUT AFFECTING THE COLLECTION OR SPENDING OF ANY OTHER REVENUES OR FUNDS, INCLUDING THE ANNUAL COLLECTION APPROVED IN THE LIBRARY DISTRICT'S 1995 ELECTION, UNDER ARTICLE X, SECTION 20 OF THE COLORADO CONSTITUTION, OR ANY OTHER LAW?

4B-SOUTHEAST WELD FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT

SHALL SOUTHEAST WELD FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT TAXES BE INCREASED BY \$515,747.00 ANNUALLY, AND BY WHATEVER ADDITIONAL AMOUNTS ARE ANNUALLY RAISED THEREAFTER, BY IMPOSING AN ADDITIONAL MILL LEVY OF 2.0 MILLS (FOR A TOTAL MILL LEVY OF 7.764) UPON TAXABLE PROPERTY WITHIN THE DISTRICT, COMMENCING IN TAX YEAR 2015 (FOR COLLECTION IN FISCAL YEAR 2016) WITH SUCH TAX PROCEEDS TO BE USED FOR GENERAL OPERATING AND CAPITAL EXPENSES, SPECIFICALLY INCLUDING, BUT NOT LIMITED TO:

MAINTAINING NECESSARY INFRASTRUCTURE TO REDUCE RESPONSE TIMES, THEREBY ALLOWING FIREFIGHTERS AND PARAMEDICS TO ARRIVE QUICKLY AND SAFELY TO BRING LIFESAVING SKILLS AND EQUIPMENT TO OUR CITIZENS;

OPERATING AND IMPROVING CURRENT LEVELS OF OUR FIRE PROTECTION AND AMBULANCE SERVICES TO MORE ADEQUATELY PROVIDE FOR THE PUBLIC'S SAFETY AND WELFARE; AND

FOR ANY OTHER PURPOSES PERMITTED BY LAW AND SHALL THE DISTRICT BE AUTHORIZED TO COLLECT AND SPEND ALL REVENUES GENERATED FROM SUCH MILL LEVY INCREASE AS A VOTER APPROVED REVENUE CHANGE AND AN EXCEPTION EACH YEAR TO ANY SPENDING OR REVENUE LIMITATIONS CONTAINED IN ARTICLE X, SECTION 20 OF THE COLORADO CONSTITUTION OR SECTION 29-1-301, C.R.S., THAT WOULD OTHERWISE APPLY?

4C-SOUTHEAST WELD FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT

Shall the existing limitations on two consecutive terms of office (8 years) as contained in Article XVIII, Section 11 of the Colorado Constitution be eliminated as applied to the Southeast Weld Fire Protection District's Board of Directors from the date of election forward?

4C-BENNETT FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT

Shall the limitation of two consecutive terms of office for members of the Board of Directors of the Bennett Fire Protection District No. 7 imposed by Article XVIII, Section 11 of the Colorado Constitution, be lengthened to not more than three consecutive terms of office, pursuant to the right granted to the voters of the District in Article XVIII, Section 11, to lengthen, shorten, or eliminate the limitations on terms of office?

4D-STRASBURG PARK AND RECREATION DISTRICT

5A-NORTH RANGE VILLAGE METRO DISTRICT

SHALL NORTH RANGE VILLAGE METROPOLITAN DISTRICT TAXES BE INCREASED \$230,000 ANNUALLY, OR BY SUCH LESSER ANNUAL AMOUNT AS MAY BE NECESSARY TO FINANCIALLY ENABLE THE DISTRICT TO ASSUME THE PERPETUAL RESPONSIBILITIES AND OBLIGATIONS OF THE NORTH RANGE VILLAGE

HOMEOWNERS ASSOCIATION, INC. AND THE FOXTON VILLAGE HOMEOWNERS ASSOCIATION, INC.: SUCH TAXES TO CONSIST OF AN AD VALOREM MILL LEVY IMPOSED WITHOUT LIMITATION OF RATE OR WITH SUCH LIMITATIONS AS MAY BE DETERMINED BY THE BOARD, AND IN AMOUNTS SUFFICIENT TO PRODUCE THE ANNUAL INCREASE SET FORTH ABOVE OR SUCH LESSER AMOUNT AS MAY BE NECESSARY, TO BE USED FOR THE PURPOSE OF PAYING THE DISTRICT'S OPERATIONS, MAINTENANCE, AND OTHER EXPENSES; AND SHALL THE PROCEEDS OF SUCH TAXES AND INVESTMENT INCOME THEREON BE COLLECTED AND SPENT BY THE DISTRICT AS A VOTER-APPROVED REVENUE CHANGE IN 2015 AND IN EACH YEAR THEREAFTER, WITHOUT REGARD TO ANY SPENDING, REVENUE-RAISING, OR OTHER LIMITATION CONTAINED WITHIN ARTICLE X, SECTION 20 OF THE COLORADO CONSTITUTION, OR SECTION 29-1-301, COLORADO REVISED STATUTES?
